"We used to have a larder and it had a marble shelf inside, so we never had fridges or freezers. But what we used to do, we used to put that food on that marble shelf and it used to keep. Then we had a coal bunker which was made of concrete and a little bit to take the coal out, 'cos you only used to have coal fires."

"There was a fantastic like traditional toy shop called Meeks, it was like a Harry Potter sort of toy shop."

"Padnall stores is just down the road. It was a little like cottage, elderly-worldly sort of cottage, and it was known locally as the Offy (...) It had an off license - he sold loads of stuff, you know, cards and sweets."

Mike's Story

"If you were going to the shops on East Road, you used to say 'I am just going around the corner' (...) And if you were going to Chadwell Heath High Street, you were 'going up the top' as it were called. Some people called it 'up the top' and some people called it 'up the bottom'. So I suppose it depended on what way your house faced!"
