Remembering Marks Gate and North Chaqwell Heath

Tantony Green (...) always used to have a Fun Day. There was stalls and things going on for children - there was five-aside football which my son always participated and my late husband was always the manager there. (...) It was a real good fun time (...) there was also a DJ, so it had all the music blaring around the area."

Throughout the years, Marks Gate and Chadwell Heath have formed distinct identities, but both have been home to hardworking tight-knit communities. The community hall hosted weekly discos, locals enjoyed pints at The Crooked Billet and the White Horse, and everyone came to watch the annual Fun Run, fundraising for Chadwell Heath Hospital.

JOY [About] Chadwell Heath Hospital] Absolutely everybody knew everybody else, it was just like working in a village. (...) You didn't feel awkward going on to any wards or talking to a sister or the doctor (...) Everybody joined in. We used to do fetes and that used to be wonderful (...) Every ward had their own stall and the money they raised would just go to their ward."

I can always remember when it was the 1966 world cup 'cos I was only probably 17 and everybody congregated in there - and I can still remember that night!"
